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
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Message from the Executive Director

Dear Friends of AFSSA,

What is our way forward in the next 5 hours, 5 days, 5 weeks, 5 months, 5 years? How will we stay safe? What's the cost? What's making it harder, more dangerous... and what's making it easier, clearing a safe path forward? Who can we trust with our lives and our livelihood?

Survivors of domestic and sexual violence have to answer these questions every day. They must conduct complex analysis for every decision and must do it in a state of personal crisis. Their process is riddled with risk and uncertainty. Their risk is heightened with societal chaos. Yet still, the consequences of their decisions are: Life or Death. Safety or Danger. Housed or Un-housed. Income or No Income. On and on they go along the path, enduring more obstacles and higher barriers to access fundamental needs and basic human rights... Reaching toward dignity and their dreams on the way.

Friends, I have good news: you cleared that pathway for every survivor of abuse and every community member who found AFSSA. You cleared away obstacles so survivors of violence could see beyond hours or days. You gave them weeks, months, years. You took the lead and went ahead as far as you could go, ready to welcome those who could start the journey. You offered hundreds of protective factors against abuse – from lentils and spices to lawyers and language access, from therapy and transportation to community-based care and entrepreneur classes. You made it possible for people in crisis to see a future, to dream their future, and to create our collective future.

Together, we showed people where to step, offered our hands on unsteady ground, and never stopped cheering our bold belief to everyone, up against any obstacle: "Yes, there is a way forward. Yes, we can clear the path. We respect you and your culture; you are welcome as you are." We held to the truth that survivors deserve safety and dignity. We know there is a day when the boulders will be only pebbles, when we will walk with ease and freedom.

I am honored to work alongside you, our talented and compassionate volunteers, our partners, philanthropists, foundations, families, and individuals, corporations and small businesses, cultural groups, government funders, our highly skilled staff who meet exceedingly high standards of care, and every single survivor of abuse who fights for their life and safety every day. For 33 years, we've cleared the path for people to move out of survival mode and into creator mode thanks to high trust and a rich and diverse community (that we aren't shy to celebrate!) of many cultures, ages, sexes, genders, sexual orientations, religions, national origins, economic statuses, languages, disabilities, hidden identities, and more who come together in a cooperative spirit to create a Central Texas oasis, ensuring that all survivors can have a start along the path, and that we can live safe.

You make it so. From my heart to yours, Thank you.

2024 Highlights

2024 was a momentous year for AFSSA! Here are a few of the things that impacted us and our community the most.

Record Level of Hotline Calls and Community Needs Served

AFSSA staff, volunteers, and supporters responded to a record-breaking level of community members in dangerous situations. We lowered barriers to safety and provided immediate crisis response for underserved and rural survivors, helping them out of danger and into services where they can build supports and work toward a life free from violence.

We launched new in-language peer support groups to build long-term communities for survivors. We offered, and continue to offer, new and stronger pathways to sustained safety and independence through workforce development and entrepreneur classes centered on the specific language and access needs of our community. Our clients have shown great interest in these programs, which tells us we're fulfilling the needs of our community.

PARTners in Progress: Disrupting Violence, Building Hope

In April, AFSSA hosted our first violence prevention summit, PARTners in Progress: Disrupting Violence, Building Hope. This one day summit was centered around using our values — Prevent, Advocate, Respond, and Transform — to break the cycle of violence in our community. The event, funded by the Swalm Endwoment and the UT LEAD Initiative, featured three speaker panels, a healing fair, and 18 workshops across three tracks: Survivor Healing, Youth Leadership, and Policy Advocacy. The event was an incredible success thanks to over 80 community members who attended throughout the day to hear more than 30 speakers present on topics such as language access, mental health, and art as healing.





Community and Foundations Providing Stability



In March of 2024, Asian Family Support Services of Austin was awarded \$2,000,000 for transforming the lives of Asian survivors of abuse in Central Texas through the Yield Giving Open Call, a national, multi-million dollar grant initiative focused on funding community-led and community-centered nonprofits.

In November, we welcomed our supporters to the Hyatt Regency for a night of community, dance, and heartfelt connection. "Are we doing our P.A.R.T.?" is not just a slogan at AFSSA; it is our measure of success in everything we do.




Empowerment


AFSSA's direct services team proudly serves clients pursuing an array of needs. Whether a client is seeking emotional support during a crisis or requesting referrals to attorneys to represent them in a divorce, our client advocates are fiercely advocating for their clients in the community. AFSSA is survivor-led and survivor-centered. Our staff speak 15 different languages and many come from our local Asian community. For survivors of violence, AFSSA is a place that can be trusted to understand their lives and their situations.

We strive to create an inclusive environment for our clients at AFSSA, and we are constantly evaluating what the community needs from our team to ensure they can live a life free of violence. With the aim of support and tools that lead to a survivor's liberation, autonomy, and financial sustainability, AFSSA's direct services include: safety planning; 24/7 hotline with interpretation services; legal advocacy and legal service accompaniment; hospital accompaniment; individual and group counseling; supportive transitional housing; basic needs assistance; and economic empowerment services.


In 2024, we answered

1,288 Hotline Calls through our 24/7 language accessible crisis support line.


Most clients begin their journey with AFSSA by calling our **24/7**, **confidential crisis support hotline**, but can also be referred to us through crisis shelters, legal aid organizations, national crisis hotlines, our outreach program, or by word of mouth. Advocates are available around the clock to respond to crisis calls and calls from referring agencies. Immediate access to interpreters is always available.

Clients then undergo an initial intake process with an advocate so the client can determine if they would like to receive services or can benefit from the scope of services we offer.

Empowerment

Our Economic Justice and Transitional Housing Program (EJ/TH) helps survivors prepare for and navigate the U.S. financial, economic, and employment systems to find employment and education/training so they can gain independence and become self-sufficient. The EJ Program provides comprehensive, tailored support for clients to attain self-sufficiency, including:

- job-readiness services
- financial literacy counseling
- medical and transportation advocacy
- housing support
- childcare access



received Transitional Housing through AFSSA in 2024

The TH Program offers scattered site, survivorchosen housing options for survivors of violence. Many survivors leave their abuser with few resources. Transitional Housing provides longterm housing support for up to 18 months to ensure clients and their children are able to maintain a stable home while working toward their goals toward autonomy and independence.

In Their Words

The following stories are from AFSSA clients. They have consented to have their stories shared, and their names have been changed to protect their anonymity.

Shani's Story

"I have come a long way in my journey as a survivor of DV. I have recently left the relationship after 18 years of being married. It was a long and challenging journey, but I did what I could to keep my child safe. Without the support from AFSSA, I might have never gathered the courage to leave.

"I did try to leave multiple times but couldn't because of visa, finances, and other issues.

Tammi's Story

Tammi has been with AFSSA for roughly 5 years, and throughout her time with AFSSA, she has made the request to be paired with an advocate who had knowledge and experience with Vietnamese culture. She was assigned to a Vietnamese advocate for years, but became inactive after that advocate left the agency. When she was assigned to another advocate who spoke Vietnamese, Tammi became very active again. She was always enthusiastic to work on her mental health and healing from her childhood trauma. Aside from receiving peer support, Tammi was eager and passionate about giving back to her community. She actively participates in AFSSA events, our Vietnamese-language peer support group, and is most excited to support other fellow Vietnamese domestic violence survivors in the community.

"Since the abuse was not physical, it was hard for me to explain what I was going through to anyone. When I contacted AFSSA, I received validation, understanding, and nonjudgmental support.

"I have a great case manager and a great community of peer support group members who are in similar situations.

"For anyone who is in an abusive relationship, I wish them to know that help is available; and they might not know all the steps to freedom, but one step at a time is all they need to break free from abuse."

"Being in the Vietnamese peer support group was the first time I could talk about what happened to me and my family with other Vietnamese people in a safe and supportive space. The group taught me that we don't have to repeat what happened to us for the next generation. We have the choice to change the future for our children and ourselves.

"Being in the group also marks a new stage in my healing journey because it inspires me to

continue the healing process not just in English, but Vietnamese too. The group is teaching me that Vietnamese can also be a language of empowerment, freedom of expression and new possibilities."




Education

AFSSA's Community Education, Prevention and Outreach team breaks cycles of violence through inperson and digital outreach; bi-lingual prevention programming in schools; and culturally grounded trainings and presentations to community groups, school administrators, congregational leadership and members, law enforcement officers, and health care providers.

Our programming is available in home language and always designed with an eye to meeting the various social needs and myriad of barriers that impact our clients and communities. Our prevention and community education advocates work in both in-person and digital spaces to not only connect survivors to essential life-saving services, but also to engage in conversations around healthy relationships and help communities and families build shared vocabulary around interpersonal violence. Our goal is to prevent violence and harm from occurring in the first place.







Our Impact "What Brings You to This Movement?"

AFSSA's Digital Outreach Advocate, Jenn Xia, spoke at the 2024 Silk Road Gala about what brings her to the movement.

"What brings you to this movement?"

When my mom was a young girl, she had a porcelain doll she treasured so much that she refused to touch it with her bare skin. It rested inside its box, a wall of cardboard and clear plastic between her and what she loved.

I think maybe this is how she loved us too.

When I thought about what I wanted to share today, I thought about what brings me to this movement. Seeing my parents grow up in a world that didn't love them makes me want to create a world that would love them back, and love me too. **66** Seeing my parents grow up in a world that didn't love them makes me want to create a world that would love them back, and love me too.

That it wasn't safe to open my life to people

When my mom was growing up in Nanjing, her mom would give the best pieces of pork belly to her brother.

One day, my mom came home from school and found her doll in the hands of the daughter of a family friend. Ripped plastic and oily fingerprints smudged all over its perfect face.

This is what brings me to this movement.

I'm thirteen when my dad tells me he has a younger brother that passed away his parents refuse to talk about, grief etched into the emails they send on each of our birthdays without fail.

Always with the signature, 爱你, "love you."

My dad says, "My brother was always the handsome one," and I watch him leave the dinner table before I can see him cry. And when I cry, my dad asks me to walk away so he doesn't have to see my face. outside my family. That I would always be the person that walked away from the table.

But I am crafting different models of love every day in ways a world should make sense. A world where I don't abandon the people I love and come back to a home I am proud to be building.

When I'm struggling, my friend Allyson invites me over for veggie dumplings and vitamin water so I don't bail in my blues.

And when the blues arrive at her doorstep, we eat egg rolls and chew on salty edamame and laugh on a park bench, promising we'll do better for ourselves and each other.

Our communities did not survive war, colonialism, violence and hate without deep roots in community.

This is what brings me to this movement.

I am a huge believer that breaking cycles of violence can start within your smallest circles of love, your Friday craft nights, schools, places of faith, parent groups, in this very room.

I spent years sitting in the house my mom and dad built.

Whatever brings you to this movement, your mom, your dad, your grandparents, your sibling, your partner, your friend, yourself, whatever is your guiding I ight, the hearth of the home you build, I want you to hold them close tonight.


That we survive by loving each other harder than the world could tell us we didn't belong.




